Stress placement

Words that end in a vowel, 'n' or 's' are normally stressed on the second to last syllable like co-to-rra, tor-tu-ga and pe-rro.

ga

Sound in [gato], [tortuga].

accents

Accents indicate the vowel is stressed. As seen in the word rat-ón.

z
