Read a wide range of fiction and non-fiction texts. Refine comprehension responses for vocabulary, retrieval, inference and summary questions.





Maths

Number

Recognise and find unit fractions.
Recognise and find non-unit fractions.
Recognise the equivalence of two quarters and a half.
Recognise and find three quarters.
Count in fractions up to a whole.

Time

Tell O'clock and half past.
Tell quarter past and quarter to.
Tell the time past and to the hour.
Tell the time to five minutes.
Understand how many minutes are in an hour.
Understand how many minutes are in a day.



Geography

Understand geographical similarities and differences through studying the human and physical geography of a small area of the UK and of a small area in a contrasting non-European country (Madagascar).

Learn about different types of settlement and homes.
Use simple fieldwork and observational skills to study the local park.

Learn to make a simple map.

Use a compass and make observations about the local area.



Art

Henri Rousseau

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Study the work of Henri Rousseau and use it as a stimulus to create collages.

Create a variety of images using different media including card, paper, tissue paper and fabric, with a focus on proportion. Develop techniques to create a collage display in an artist's style and evaluate this.

Compose an image of a Madagascan animal considering colour, tint and tone.



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Science

Habitats and Our Changing World

Understand whether things are living, not living or have never been living.

Consider the key features which show organisms are alive. Know a habitat is a natural place where something lives and that animals have different needs that are suited to where they live (adaptation).

Learn about how animals adapt to the places that they live in. Investigate: 'What conditions would woodlice like to live in?'



RWVE

What can we learn from sacred books?

Give reasons for why a holy book is holy.

Retell the parable of the lost sheep Retell the Exodus story.

Learn about the teachings of Jesus Retell the story of the prophet. Muhammad and the black stone.

Discuss teachings of good and bad and right and wrong.

Recognise that sacred stories are special and treated with respect.
